This detailed analysis contributes actionable insights that can guide stakeholders in implementing effective strategies to address specific challenges and foster a balanced, resilient, and sustainable tourism industry in Lombok. The integration of these strategies aims to ensure that Lombok's tourism development not only meets the demands of increasing visitor numbers but also preserves the island's unique identity and ecological integrity.

The comprehensive discussion presented here is enriched by insights drawn from past research, effectively aligning with well-established principles of sustainable tourism while providing tailored recommendations to address the distinct challenges confronted by Lombok. In the realm of infrastructure development (Mandic et al., 2018; Nguyen, 2021; Shimizu & Okamoto, 2022), valuable lessons gleaned from destinations such as Bali and Phuket underscore the integral role of meticulously planned infrastructure in not only

enhancing the allure of a tourist destination but also catalyzing robust economic growth. The identified imperative for environmental sustainability mirrors global examples, notably Costa Rica and the Galápagos Islands, where responsible tourism practices have demonstrated the preservation of natural resources and contributed to the long-term appeal of these destinations (Báez, 2002; Burbano et al., 2022; Himmelgreen et al., 2006; Mestanza-Ramón et al., 2020).

Furthermore, the discussion surrounding cultural preservation resonates with experiences from renowned cultural destinations like Kyoto and Bhutan (Lepcha et al., 2022; Sedita & Ozeki, 2022), emphasizing the significance of proactive measures such as community engagement and cultural education to shield local heritage from the potential adverse impacts of tourism influx. The emphasis on community involvement aligns seamlessly with studies on community-based tourism initiatives in locations such as Mexico's Mayan Riviera, highlighting the positive outcomes of engaging local communities in decision-making processes and ensuring more equitable distribution of tourism benefits.

The proposed strategies for natural disaster preparedness find resonance in research on destinations susceptible to natural disasters, such as Japan and New Zealand (Lin et al., 2020; United Nations, 1994; Willson & Lim, 2020). By drawing inspiration from successful strategies implemented in analogous contexts, Lombok stands to bolster its resilience and mitigate potential disruptions posed by natural calamities.

Lastly, the emphasis on a structured regulatory framework aligns with insights from destinations like Barcelona, where the absence of clear regulations can lead to challenges in managing tourism growth responsibly (Romão et al., 2023; Viana-Lora & Nel-lo-Andreu, 2023).
